They must be voluntary / 3 rd Sector organisations and members of VASLan (Voluntary Action South Lanarkshire). Unincorporated groups/individuals can apply for grant funding up to £300 but must be working with a constituted group that is willing to hold funds on behalf of the unconstituted group. Additional information about the partnership arrangements will be asked during the assessment process. All applicants will be asked for a signed copy of their constitutional documents.

Give your project a distinct name that will distinguish it from other activities carried out by your group or the core work that your organisation delivers.

Outline how you think this will benefit the communities/people that you are engaging with.

Let us know how you have identified the need for this project, who have you engaged with and what input those you are working with have had in the design and delivery of your project, if any.

Short Term Outcomes:

- Staff, volunteers, or members of the community are upskilled in some way because of participation within your activity/project
- Your activity/project has resulted in an increase of community members being involved in what could be classed as a "community activity."
- Organisation(s) or those tasked with running them, are more confident that they could guide the organisation sustainably as it tries to accomplish its aims.

Medium Term Outcomes:

- The funding/project/activity enables increased collaboration between organisations operating within the Fernhill community
- The funding/project/activity enables increased involvement from voluntary sector voices in partnership discussions/planning arrangements.
- The project, activity, or the organisation, becomes more sustainable through these actions.

Financial information

The fund can provide up to £1000 for collaborative /partnership bids. For most projects, bids of between £100 and £500 would be expected.

If you are not putting forward a partnership/collaborative bid and your total project cost is more than £500, you may want to think about "match funding". This is where 2 or more funders contribute towards the cost of the project. The benefits of this are that it allows larger sums to be accessed and therefore the potential for a bigger project. It also means that the organisation will have to report to more than one funder which may require multiple sets of outcomes to be reported against and multiple reports to be submitted.

The application form has range of "cost" categories to choose from. Please provide details on the costs associated with your proposal and allocate them to the most appropriate category.

FAQ's

Will there be any continuation or recurring funding?

It should be noted that this funding is a not a recurring fund and, therefore, applications should be sought for time limited projects.

What size of organisation can apply for the fund?

The Corra Foundation Legacy Fund is aimed at small, grassroots community groups and organisations (i.e., voluntary or community organisations; registered charities; groups or clubs; or Community Interest Companies, and community councils).

What size of grant can be awarded to applicants?

Small Grants Program £0 - £500

Collaborative / Partnership bids up to £1000

When will we receive the money?

If successful, you will be given an offer of grant acknowledgement no later than 4 weeks after the closing date. This will ask you to provide banking details and the offer will include a condition of grant contract. As soon as this information is received from a group, payment can be processed and should take 2-3 business days to arrive in your bank

When does the Fund have to be spent by?

Any funding awarded must be spent within 12 months of issue. Organisations will be asked to complete an "End of Grant" report and submit accompanying evidence within 4 weeks after the 12-month period.

How will the Fund be monitored?

We will require a project/year-end report (dependant on which is first) on the Fund's progress.
