Our internal operations were streamlined, introducing more efficient processes to enable us to provide an improved and more focussed level of organisational support.

Our engagement with partners continues to be fundamental in our efforts to ensure South Lanarkshire's Third Sector is represented at all levels.


The staff team have made significant improvements to our Engage, Promote and Involve (EPI) system, to the extent that we can now undertake analysis of South Lanarkshire's voluntary sector services to SIMD level. This facilitates better decision making, providing more detailed information, and so is an extremely useful resource.

2020 sees VASLan celebrate its 10th year as the Third Sector Interface (TSI) in South Lanarkshire. Over the course of these years VASLan has continued to adapt and develop, markedly improving levels of communication, information gathering and sharing.

The way in which we deliver support has changed over these years, as have our staff team and Board, developing to navigate the emerging challenges.

As we entered March 2020 the Covid-19 crisis meant that we had to accelerate our improvement plans, quickly bringing forward the planned changes to our working practices.

The future holds new opportunities but many unknowns, and we give an assurance that we will continue to promote the work of the sector, engage with people at all levels, and involve as many individuals and organisations as possible in our efforts to support the growth and stability of South Lanarkshire's Third Sector.





Support, Events and Consultations

Throughout this year we have introduced significant improvements to the Engage, Promote and Involve (EPI) knowledge base and we continue to work on further enhancements to improve our ability to accurately capture the state of the sector.

We further streamlined our ways of working to introduce more efficient processes which has enabled our staff to provide an improved and more focussed level of organisational support. This has allowed us to increase our levels of activity and engagement with the sector.



Through targeted communication the number of people we reached increased by 73%



Volunteer registrations increased by 47%



89 events facilitated an increase of 27%

Third Sector Forum

We continued to host our quarterly Third Sector Forums in all four localities. These Forum events have been restructured to include sector and partner presentations, briefings and consultations along with knowledge sharing activities while still providing opportunity for organisations to network.

The themes for this year's forums were:

- Third Sector Engagement in Community Development
- Sustainability
- Enterprising Communities
- The Power of Information



The Forums receive an excellent response with 239 people in attendance over the year.

Celebrations

In partnership with Voluntary Action North Lanarkshire (VANL) and Lanarkshire Green Health Partnership, VASLan promoted volunteering outdoors during Volunteers' Week. The "Growing volunteering across Lanarkshire" campaign saw VASLan staff travel across South Lanarkshire visiting organisations that offered green health volunteering and handing out seed bombs to encourage people to get outside and enjoy their beautiful surroundings.

Our Annual Third Sector Awards once again, received an overwhelming response. The large number of nominations from all four localities highlighted the incredible impact that volunteers and organisations make to their local communities. The event saw our youngest ever

Contribution to Volunteering Award for his exceptional volunteering as a Committee member with Blantyre Community Council. A total of 14 Awards were presented at the event. The 200 people in attendance enjoyed watching nomination videos of shortlisted candidates and the participation of a wide ranging section of the Sector truly made this event a success.





We successfully delivered our Scottish Government work-plan and have been actively involved in national work with Scottish Government and other TSI's, in support of South Lanarkshire's young people we have been instrumental in administering and driving improvements with the National review of the Saltire awards.

Consultations and Campaigns

This year we have partaken in a significant number of Mental Health consultations as part of the Mental Health and Wellbeing Strategy steering group. This includes supporting a pan-Lanarkshire Suicide Prevention event exploring actions that can be taken by partners, particularly those in the front line.

We have increased our engagement with partners and the sector as a whole:

172 Campaigns reached over 37,000 recipients





265 strategic engagements with partners

Partnerships and Strategic Involvement

We have been actively involved with the quarterly TSI Social Enterprise Practitioners Forum which is attended by staff from Scotland's TSIs and presents a platform for staff to discuss social enterprise support, share experiences. Through these forum events and the intelligence gathered, our TSI social enterprise practitioners are better able to inform social enterprises of upcoming opportunities and issues relating to the sector.

As a member of Children in Scotland, VASLan also amplifies the voices of the third sector in South Lanarkshire and uses the local sector's experiences to inform and influence national children's policies.

We have continued our engagement with the National TSI Children's Services Network to discuss Children's Issues. This provides a link to other discussion platforms such as VOICES Forum hosted by Children in Scotland.









In 2019 VASLan continued to support the Lanarkshire Green Health **Partnership** participated in the NHS Green Health event at Chatelherault. The event brought together health & social care professionals to raise awareness of the wide range of green health volunteering opportunities and the benefits they can bring.

Moving Forward



2020 has been a challenging year, like many of our partners VASLan have had to swiftly adapt to new working arrangements to allow us to comply with the necessary restrictions surrounding the Coronavirus crisis.

Throughout we have continued to provide the conduit to the Third Sector at a strategic level on key areas such as Health and Social Care, the Lanarkshire Mental Health Strategy, the National Third Sector GIRFEC Project, South Lanarkshire's Adult and Child Protection Committees, and to our Lanarkshire Resilience Partners.

We have continued to provide support and engagement with local organisations through virtual platforms and improved methods of communication.

We had plans in place to allow us to move forward this year, however, the implications of the pandemic have resulted in the acceleration of our improvement journey, bringing forward some of the change decisions we had planned to progress over the year.

This improvement journey will see us **reshaping** our staff team, **relocating** our offices and **refocusing** our methods of support to South Lanarkshire's Third Sector.

We have started on these improvements, and want to assure you, that embedded within our plans for the future is our overarching aim to **Engage with**, **Promote and Involve** South Lanarkshire's Third Sector

As for the wider voluntary sector and community groups across South Lanarkshire, it would be remise of us not to highlight the unprecedented levels of direct action by members of the community and voluntary groups throughout the pandemic.

Our sector has worked collectively to provide support and engagement over an extended period to engage their communities and protect and support vulnerable groups.

The scale of this work has been phenomenal and there's a tangible desire to build on the excellent work developed and delivered by engaged and active communities across South Lanarkshire.









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
